


TETFUND/NRF WEBINAR SERIES

Scholars are required to leave Australia for a minimum of two years after completing their scholarship. Failure to do so will result in the scholar incurring a debt for the total accrued cost of their scholarship.

ETHICS DESK

The Ethics Desk Unit at the University of Lagos is located within the Research Management Office. This unit provides essential services to all researchers by guiding them through the process of obtaining ethical approval from both the Research Ethics Committee (ERC) and the Animal Care and Use Research Ethics Committee (ACUREC). This support ensures that all research conducted aligns with ethical integrity standards. Recently, the Ethics desk unit officers participated in Proactive Ethics Program (PEP) held from January 29-31, 2025.

Here is the Highlight from the Program. This program equips participants with essential knowledge to address compliance issues at both basic and advanced levels across various sectors, including Administrative, Academic, Financial, Research, and Athletics. The Workshop provided a comprehensive understanding of legal, ethical and moral definitions, emphasizing ethical theories (ETS) and ethical decision-making procedures (EDMPS) designed to prevent potential ethical and legal dilemmas. Proactive ethics emphasises the importance of anticipating and addressing ethical challenges before they manifest, rather than merely responding to issues post-factum. By integrating moral, ethical, and legal frameworks, institutions can enhance operational standards and improve service delivery.

A key component discussed was the balance between ethics and law, recognizing that scenarios can be categorised as follows:
Illegal/Ethical: Lawyers navigating complex legal scenarios.
Legal/Unethical: Situations warranting further dialogue, possibly through Ethics Committees.

The significance of ethics in higher education cannot be overstated. It fosters academic integrity, responsible research practices, and cultivates a culture of respect and inclusivity within institutions. By promoting honesty and fairness higher education institutions can combat academic dishonesty, including plagiarism and cheating. Embracing proactive ethics is essential for instilling a culture of integrity and responsibility in higher education, ultimately reducing the risk of ethical misconduct across all facets of the institution.
